About the webinar

We'll hear from people with lived experience, share examples of harmful language, and explore relational alternatives that foster dignity and connection. This isn't about wordsmithing – it's about exploring what lies underneath the words we use. Whether you're a caseworker, parent, carer or policy maker, this is a space to reflect on what we say and write - and the impact it has. The webinar aims to:

- Deepen understanding of the real-world impact of the words we use spoken and written on children, families and carers.
- Amplify lived experience, helping participants hear directly from families and young people affected by harmful language.
- Challenge common terms and phrases that reflect bureaucracy over humanity, and explore what they reveal about underlying attitudes and values.
- Encourage reflection and change, supporting participants to consider how they can shift to more relational practice.
- Start a broader conversation, with ideas to keep the momentum going across organisations and sectors.

The webinar will include a facilitated panel discussion where you will hear stories and ideas from a young person, a family member, a peer advocate and a former caseworker.
